1.1 Description

In this course you will complete practical exercises working in two cornerstones of news reporting rounds – the courts and local government. You will develop a sound knowledge of courts and local government and report on actual court cases and council meetings. Your reports will be balanced, accurate, fair and legally “safe”. They will be of a high standard suitable for publication in a converged media environment and will meet strict deadlines.

Assessment Tasks 1, 2 & 3: News stories portfolios

Goal:	To develop skills and understanding around generating news stories in two specific areas
Product:	Written Piece
Format:	Professional/industry format. You will interview subjects and write news reports for print, broadcast or online as directed in tutorials.
Criteria:	Each news report in your portfolio will be assessed as follows: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Overall quality of reports; • Balance, accuracy and fairness; • Use of correct news writing style; • Newsworthiness of topic and identification of story lead; • Demonstrated understandings of the rules, laws and conventions in the areas reported on.

7. Directed study hours

10.1 Assessment: Academic Integrity

10.2 Assessment: Additional requirements

Eligibility for Supplementary Assessment

Your eligibility for supplementary assessment in a course is dependent of the following conditions applying:

- a) The final mark is in the percentage range 47% to 49.4%
- b) The course is graded using the Standard Grading scale
- c) You have not failed an assessment task in the course due to academic misconduct

10.3 Assessment: Submission penalties

Late submission of assessment tasks will be penalised at the following maximum rate:

- 5% (of the assessment task's identified value) per day for the first two days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- 10% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the third day
- 20% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the fourth day and subsequent days up to and including seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- A result of zero is awarded for an assessment task submitted after seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.

Weekdays and weekends are included in the calculation of days late.
