1. What is this course about?

1.1 Description

In this course, you will develop knowledge and skills for implementing the Queensland Senior Secondary History curriculum. You will learn how to design lesson plans and learning sequences that will engage diverse learners. You will explore and analyse a range of pedagogy, assessment and reporting strategies that maximise learning outcomes for senior students, including developing strategies for supporting literacy, numeracy and ICT learning within History.

1.2 Course topics

- * Queensland Senior history curriculum as devised by the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (hereafter QCAA)
- * Curriculum planning and alignment of content, pedagogy and assessment for senior history
- * Teaching and learning strategies for engagement of diverse learners in history
- * Assessment and reporting practices in senior history
- * Historical skills for senior secondary students
- * Integrating resources including information and communication technologies (ICT) into the history curriculum
- * Literacy and numeracy in senior history
- * Embedding Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories, culture and knowledges in the senior history curriculum.

Assessment Task 1: Learning sequence, lesson plan and presentation

Goal:	The purpose of this task is to demonstrate your ability to develop a Senior history learning sequence, lesson plan and presentation.
Product:	Written piece and presentation
Format:	<p>Critically analyse the Senior History curriculum to identify an inquiry topic from Unit 1 of your chosen syllabus. Design a six-lesson learning sequence for the inquiry topic. Your learning sequence must include the following components:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Rationale (introduce the inquiry topic and locate it in the 2019 syllabus) • Learning goals and cognitive verbs • Resources, including use of ICT to enhance learning • Considerations for diversity, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and their histories • Considerations for differentiation of learner needs • Timely formative feedback mechanisms throughout the course, and evaluation of student data to inform teaching • Intended summative assessment tasks and conditions as specified in the syllabus • A statement of intended reporting of summative feedback to students and parents • Use 21st Century skills <p>Develop a lesson plan for one lesson in the sequence that makes use of ICT. Include considerations for diversity and differentiation. Develop a PowerPoint presentation for an interactive part of the lesson.</p> <p><i>Formative feedback will be provided prior to submission.</i></p>
Criteria:	1. Knowledge of History content and curriculum documents in the learning sequence.

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Assessment Task 2: Senior history teaching sequence and lesson plan presentation

Goal:	The goal of this task is to demonstrate your knowledge of the senior secondary lecture topics.
Product:	Quiz
Format:	<p>You will participate in a 20-minute online Quiz during your lecture to demonstrate your understanding of senior secondary curriculum. The topics will include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • History of senior schooling in Queensland • Types of senior secondary syllabuses • Role of cognitive verbs in senior secondary syllabuses and assessment • Curriculum design and alignment • ATAR and QCE processes for senior secondary • Access and reasonable adjustment for senior secondary assessment • Diagnostic, formative, summative assessment and reporting in senior secondary • Summative assessment feedback and moderation practices in senior secondary • The role of literacy and numeracy and 21st century skills in senior secondary <p>You will require access to your own mobile device to undertake the quiz during the lecture.</p>

Assessment Task 3: Formative and Summative Assessment and Reporting

Goal:	The purpose of this task is to demonstrate your understanding of summative and formative assessment, data storage and reporting in History in years 11 and 12.
Product:	Assessment item
Format:	<p>You are required to develop a source-based assessment task based on your selected inquiry topic from Task 1 which details summative methods of assessment and reporting. The assessment item should be presented as (i) a 'ready-for-use' summative assessment item with (ii) a set of accompanying notes.</p> <p>The assessment item should:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • meet the principles of assessment and requirements of the QCAA assessment in Years 11 and 12 for Summative Internal Assessment 1 – Examination – Essay in response to historical sources • be original, authentic and related to the learning objectives • include a cover sheet that articulates the conditions and features of the task for the students

7. What are the course activities?

7.1 Directed study hours

A 12 unit course will have total of 150 learning hours which will include directed study hours (including online if required), self-directed learning and completion of assessable tasks. A blended learning approach is used to deliver this course, including a mix of synchronous and asynchronous materials and activities accessed through Blackboard. Directed study hours may vary by location. Student workload is calculated at 12.5 learning hours per one unit.

This course will be delivered via technology-enabled learning and teaching. All lectures will remain in this mode for Semester 2 2020. When government guidelines allow, students that elected on-campus study via the class selection process will be advised when on campus tutorials and practical sessions will resume.

Weeks 4-8	Understanding the components of the Australian Senior Secondary Curriculum and developing knowledge and skills about teaching senior History courses via tutorials and student presentations that demonstrate understanding and application of historical knowledge and skills.
Weeks 9-10	Developing knowledge and skills in assessing student learning in Senior Secondary History: Ancient /Modern. Practising presentation of content and inquiry learning
