1. What is this course about?

1.1. Description

In this course you will consolidate and synthesise your midwifery knowledge and skills as you work toward competence to register and practice. You will be challenged to examine your role as a midwife to enable you to practice as a future oriented professional. Specifically, you will examine the role of the midwife in leadership and governance. You will examine professional and regulatory requirements as they provide the framework for leadership in the profession.

All - Assessment Task 1: Written assignment

GOAL:	You are aiming to identify the health needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women to the maternity services. You will discuss key perinatal health issues for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Specific reference is to be made to the potential contribution midwifery could make to improve the health of this group.	
PRODUCT:	Written Piece	
FORMAT:	An original word document assignment using evidence from a review of the academic and government literature to present a contemporary discussion of appropriate maternity services and midwifery care.

GOAL:	Your goal is to critique an evidence-based clinical guideline.	
PRODUCT:	Report	
FORMAT:	A 2000-word report (template provided)	
CRITERIA:	No.	Learning Outcome assessed
	1	Evidence of critical appraisal of an existing maternity and/or neonatal clinical guideline, using a validated appraisal instrument.
	2	Use of relevant literature to support argument and critique
	3	Information literacy skills: use of sources and citations
	4	Written presentation including structure, grammar, application of referencing protocol (Harvard or APA 6th)

All - Assessment Task 3: Concept Map and Case Study

GOAL:	Your goal is to visually articulate your proposed approach to practice as a midwife. You will be required to demonstrate this approach to practice within professional, regulatory and legislative frameworks.	
PRODUCT:	Written Piece	
FORMAT:	Concept Map (5%): Concept maps form a visual representation of your thought processes. Information about concept maps will be provided on the course Blackboard site. Case Study (30%): 1500 word written response to a pre-determined case study, explaining your anticipated approach to your future practice as a midwife, and how this aligns with the Midwife Standards for Practice and Code of Conduct for Midwives.

10.3. Assessment: Submission penalties

Late submission of assessment tasks may be penalised at the following maximum rate:

- 5% (of the assessment task's identified value) per day for the first two days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.

- 10% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the third day - 20% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the fourth day and subsequent days up to and including seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.

- A result of zero is awarded for an assessment task submitted after seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task. Weekdays and weekends are included in the calculation of days late. To request an extension you must contact your course coordinator to negotiate an outcome.
