1. What is this course about?

1.1 Description

In this capstone course you will undertake a research and/or industry-based project in order to develop, refine and showcase your knowledge and command of disciplinary expertise. This self-directed project, which must be approved by the course coordinator prior to commencement, in a Social Science or Humanities field will enable you to develop skills of project development, management, coordination, negotiation and delivery. This capstone course allows you to demonstrate professional skills, academic expertise, and critical practice in a project that represents the culmination of your learning in your program or major.

Assessment 1: Project Plan

Goal:	You will collaborate with a multidisciplinary team to develop a project plan. You will identify, discuss and negotiate a Social Science/Humanities Project designed to address an articulated problem, opportunity or gap. You will identify an audience/client to whom the project will be delivered. Key concepts and practices of theory, teamwork, self-reflection and constructive planning are part of this work.
Product:	Plan
Format:	<p>Develop a group project plan.</p> <p>The size of the plan is dependent on the number of team members – each member contributes approximately 700 words.</p> <p>The plan must use specific skills and competencies of the team members: Social Sciences, Humanities, Creative Industries and Communication.</p> <p>The project plan must also include a schedule for completion and a summary of how tasks and time will be managed. The plan should be submitted in a written format via Blackboard. The format can be negotiated with your project supervisor.</p>
Criteria:	<p>You will be assessed on:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Identification of a relevant problem or opportunity and conceptualisation of a creative and feasible solution or response • Level of detail and achievability of proposed schedule and project management • Comprehension of the theoretical and discipline specific skills needed to execute the project • Collaboration and team project management • Professional communication

Assessment Task 2: Plan – individual check point

Goal:	The <i>Social Sciences/Humanities Project</i> is a major complex group task and you are personally responsible for the success of your groups project. This task requires you to evidence your own work to date and your future contribution bench marks. You will also individually record and map out the products and work of your team members. The goal of this task is to demonstrate ethical project management.
Product:	Plan
Format:	The Plan – individual check point report may take different forms. Approx. 2000 words May use project management software, charts, graphs or any other relevant format/tools negotiated with your supervisor.
Criteria:	You will be assessed on: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Accuracy of e-journal entries and progress report • Demonstration of planning and time management • Critical reflection on project experiences and application of disciplinary knowledge and skills to the project • Analysis of how creative problem solving has been utilised • Demonstration of effective communication skills

Assessment Task 3: Social Sciences/Humanities artefact

Goal:	The goal of this task is to present your final project outcome and demonstrate discipline specific expertise.
Product:	Artefact - Creative, and Written Piece
Format:	The format of your presentation will depend on your project and must be negotiated with your project supervisor. As a group or individually you will present your project's final outcome to a designated 'audience/client'. You will use relevant professional presentation tools and should demonstrate effective communication with your audience. Your presentation will include a project title, and identify the aims of the project and its target audience.
Criteria:	You will be assessed on: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Application of discipline specific skills to develop an effective project that addresses a problem or opportunity • Evidence of skill attainment and learning during the project • Quality and creativity of thinking, communication and practice • Execution, relevance and appropriateness of project's exhibition/presentation • Extent to which project's exhibition/presentation engages intended audience • Demonstration of planning and time management

7. What are the course activities?

7.1 Directed study hours

Such time as required in the first three weeks to prepare the project in consultation with your project supervisor. Throughout semester there be there will be a three-hour workshop each week. Formative feedback will be provided during workshop time.

You are expected to complete a total of 96 hours on the project, which is the equivalent of one working day, or 8 hours per week for 12 weeks. These arrangements may vary (e.g. 2 days some weeks increasing to 3 days for some weeks) depending upon your study timetable, and the time needed each week to complete tasks. Progress checks also occur several times during the semester.

Module One	<p>In Module One you will:</p> <p>Identify and evaluate a Social Science/Humanities problem, opportunity or gap that needs to be addressed.</p> <p>Form a multidisciplinary group and collaboratively consider possible approaches to engage with the selected problem, opportunity or gap.</p> <p>Identify, through a collaborative approach of discussion and negotiation, and plan a Social Science/Humanities project designed to address an articulated problem, opportunity or gap that needs to be addressed. Key concepts and practices of theory, teamwork, self-reflection and creative planning are in-built into this Module.</p>
Module Two:	<p>Social Sciences/Humanities project research and development. This module builds on Module One. In this module you will:</p> <p>Undertake and manage the project plan created in Task One (as part of Module One) by allocating time and applying disciplinary expertise to achieving the identified plan;</p> <p>Anticipate and reflect on problems in achieving the plan and articulate and effect problem solving approaches:</p> <p>Work as part of a team to design a creative solution or act on a Social Sciences/Humanities gap or opportunity, to meet determined time and resource restrictions.</p> <p>Key concepts and practices of self-reflection, teamwork, theory, project management and creative planning and making, are in-built into this Module.</p>
Module Three	<p>Creative, Design and Communication project completion and refinement. This module builds on Modules One and Two. In this module you will:</p> <p>Design, construct, refine and present an artefact (digital or otherwise) that engages a Social Sciences/Humanities gap or opportunity, to a designated audience;</p> <p>Reflect on the skills, qualities and achievements you developed throughout Modules One, Two and Three;</p> <p>Reflect on any comments or questions your designated audience/client offer.</p> <p>Key concepts and practices of self-reflection, teamwork, project management and completion, and 'audience/client' are in-built into this Module.</p>

10.1 Assessment: Academic Integrity

10.2 Assessment: Additional requirements

Eligibility for Supplementary Assessment

Your eligibility for supplementary assessment in a course is dependent of the following conditions applying:

- a) The final mark is in the percentage range 47% to 49.4%
- b) The course is graded using the Standard Grading scale
- c) You have not failed an assessment task in the course due to academic misconduct

10.3 Assessment: Submission penalties

Late submission of assessment tasks will be penalised at the following maximum rate:

- 5% (of the assessment task's identified value) per day for the first two days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- 10% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the third day
- 20% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the fourth day and subsequent days up to and including seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- A result of zero is awarded for an assessment task submitted after seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.

Weekdays and weekends are included in the calculation of days late.
