1.1. Description

This course introduces you to the domains of social work and human services and the various concepts and frameworks that practitioners use to understand and support individuals, groups and communities within their social contexts. The wide variety of practice roles, fields and contexts within social work and human services are examined, unified by an emphasis on appreciating the purpose and core values underpinning practice. The course aims to provide an overview of the breadth of social work and human services practice within contemporary Australian society.

All - Assessment Task 1: Individual Reflection

GOAL:	For you to reflect on your motivations and values for undertaking social work/ human services practice. Social work and human services practice is reflexive, requiring practitioners to be aware of their own orientations in a practice context and how these fit with the values and purpose of social work and human services practice. This short reflection is designed to assist you to appreciate how you understand the fit between yourself and social work and human services practice. It also provides an opportunity for you to receive feedback from your tutor about your written skills and capacity to link reflections to relevant literature.

All - Assessment Task 3: Case study analysis

GOAL:	This Learning/Assessment Task requires you identify, reflect on and apply relevant course concepts and processes to a given scenario. Practice scenarios will be provided midway through the semester. Together with one other student you will deliver a presentation to your tutorial group in weeks 11-12. Your group will need to present a multi-perspective understanding of the scenario, highlighting how various chosen practice concepts and processes covered in the course can assist in understanding and undertaking practice in the scenario. Following the presentation each student will submit an individual analysis summarising the key points of their analysis including what they have personally foregrounded and why in their reflection on the scenario, and which core social work concepts, values and processes they have drawn on. Students are also required to include in their individual analysis reflection on how at least 3 other student presentations assisted them further develop their presentation analysis.
PRODUCT:	Case Study
FORMAT:	SUBMIT: Group Presentation - Weeks 11-12, 1200 word individual write up - End of Week 13. This assessment comprises of a 10 minute (maximum) Powerpoint presentation developed and delivered with one other student (unless negotiated with the tutor), submitted to BlackBoard prior to presentation (Part A) with an individual reflective summary of this analysis submitted to BlackBoard at the end of Week 13 (Part B). The presentation will be judged by the quality of the material presented on the day by your group as assessed by your tutor. This requires you to be present on the day (unless a formal exemption is obtained) and actively contribute to your groups presentation.

10.1. Assessment: Academic Integrity

10.2. Assessment: Additional Requirements

10.3. Assessment: Submission penalties

Late submission of assessment tasks may be penalised at the following maximum rate:

- 5% (of the assessment task's identified value) per day for the first two days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.

- 10% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the third day - 20% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the fourth day and subsequent days up to and including seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.

- A result of zero is awarded for an assessment task submitted after seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task. Weekdays and weekends are included in the calculation of days late. To request an extension you must contact your course coordinator to negotiate an outcome.
