1. What is this course about?

1.1. Description

Critical thinking is vital for university students as it is the process by which we collect and evaluate evidence to reach rational, informed and ethical conclusions. Using the framework of the sociological imagination, students will investigate contentious issues in contemporary society. You will learn how to debate topics based on fact and logic and to develop respectful, cogent and informed arguments. You will learn how to think, not what to think, but to consider the daily decisions you make and how they shape the world.

The course approaches critical thinking at the scale of the individual and society.

Focus on individual skills: Critical thinking (analysis, evaluation, inference.), argument analysis

Focus on social issues: the influences of history, culture and social structures on social issues and individual experience, aka, sociological imagination

Engaging with discipline knowledge and skills at foundational level, broad application of knowledge and skills in familiar contexts and with support. Limited or no prerequisites. Normally, associated with the first full-time study year of an undergraduate program.

All - Assessment Task 1: Online quiz

GOAL:	Students will focus their attention on applying basic critical thinking skills to recognise patterns, and to identify reasons, conclusions and arguments within a message.

All - Assessment Task 2: Structured critical analysis

GOAL:	Students demonstrate their ability to apply critical analysis skills to a published text related to a current Australian social issue.	
PRODUCT:	Written Piece	
FORMAT:	Students select one current Australian social issue and, using the template provided, identify and evaluate elements of argument structure used by the author(s).

All - Assessment Task 3: Discussion essay

GOAL:	Students demonstrate their ability to analyse a topic and produce an academic essay on a contested social issue.	
PRODUCT:	Essay	
FORMAT:	Students follow the conventions of a discussion essay which examines factors affecting an Australian social issue. At least two different positions on the issue are to be identified.

10.3. Assessment: Submission penalties

Late submission of assessment tasks may be penalised at the following maximum rate:

- 5% (of the assessment task's identified value) per day for the first two days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- 10% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the third day - 20% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the fourth day and subsequent days up to and including seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- A result of zero is awarded for an assessment task submitted after seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task. Weekdays and weekends are included in the calculation of days late. To request an extension you must contact your course coordinator to negotiate an outcome.
